THE SPIRIT GUIDES US TO ALL TRUTH

Our first two readings in today's liturgy challenged our imagination, inviting us to be caught up in awe before the mystery of God so infinitely beyond our capacity to comprehend, and at the same time so attractive, that we can't help but try. Now we hear Jesus tell the disciples that it's OK that they can't take it all in. There is so much more he would have liked to communicate, but it was beyond them. It is beyond *us* still. What is wonderful is that our limitation is not a dead end. Jesus doesn't just say, "You can't get it." He says, "You can't take it in now, but bit by bit you'll be led into it until it takes you in entirely."

When we read today's Gospel (John 16:12-15) in its literary context of the Last Supper discourse, we understand the direct reference Jesus is making. He is explaining that his upcoming suffering and death are too much for the disciples to bear. He promised them that the Spirit would guide them, and we have inherited the Christian faith and scriptures as the proof of that promise fulfilled. When they could not understand, when horrific events frightened the loyalty and faith right out of them, they gradually learned to comprehend it in an entirely new and unexpected way. With the help of the Spirit, they began to realize that their crucified Lord was indeed the one God lifted up and highly exalted. But that wasn't all.

Jesus says that what the Spirit reveals will not be a new creation or invention, but the revelation of what is there, what has always been available to be heard at the heart of the universe. The Spirit will reveal the divine perspective on the happenings of history. In the same way that Jesus could understand his upcoming passion as victory and glorification, the Spirit reveals how God is continually acting in the world and how God desires to act through the community of disciples. Jesus calls that revelation "truth." Calling it truth means that it goes beyond appearances, inferences and prejudices to the very heart of life and human destiny. The Spirit can reveal what is to come because the very same Spirit was part of setting creation on its path toward God and remains present throughout.

This is heady stuff, and it would be easy to get lost in it. That's reflected in the way John writes. His every image has some connection with all that went before and what will come after. But in the end, it is also very simple. If we will accept the fact that the mystery of God is not a theory to be explained but an invitation to participate in love's dynamic, we will finally begin to know what we are talking about. We may come to know it so well that we get caught up in it, realizing that what can't be put into words must be put into action.

SENIOR COMMUNITY GATHERING

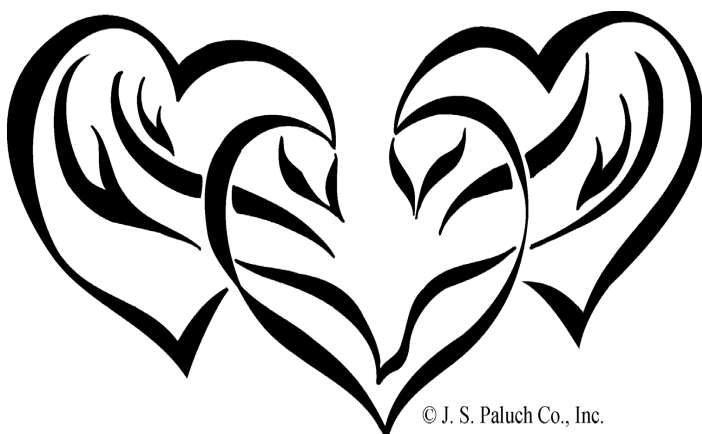

BREAD FOR THE WORLD

2016 Offering of Letters

Theme: *Survive and Thrive*

After all Masses on the weekend of **June 4/5**, Parishioners will have an opportunity to have positive impact on the lives of those most vulnerable in the world especially new mothers and their young children. Despite tremendous progress, life for many women and children in developing countries ends early. Every two minutes, a woman dies from complications in pregnancy or childbirth. Every five seconds, a child dies somewhere; many who do survive suffer from stunting which causes lifelong health problems and irreversible damage to their physical and cognitive development. Often in these cases, the major causes are preventable disease and malnutrition.

Bread for the World says, “Fortunately, proven steps – like providing nutritious food and showing how to prepare it, food supplements, pre-natal and post-natal care, hygiene, vaccines and medications - can have a huge impact. The U.S. has led global efforts to improve the survival rates of women and children by operating and funding programs in many developing nations. The world is positioned to accelerate progress on nutrition and health of women and children. Additional funding is critical in this effort. Reform in the ways food aid and investments in agriculture in developing nations is needed. Many related programs are supported through USAID (U.S. Agency for International Development). Reform is planned under the Global Food Security Act, passed by the Senate within the past few days. Funding is managed within the U.S. State Department under appropriations approved by Congress.

What can you do? After Masses on the weekend of June 4/5, join many other parishioners in signing letters to our Congressional representatives under our annual BFW Offering of Letters campaign requesting that they actively support increasing funding for maternal and child nutrition programs to \$230 million from the current \$115 million. Details on the process will appear in next week’s bulletin.

ANNUAL SACRED HEART NOVENA

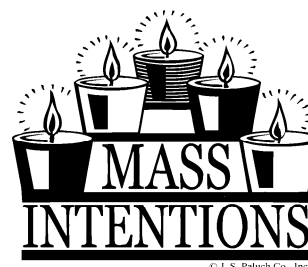

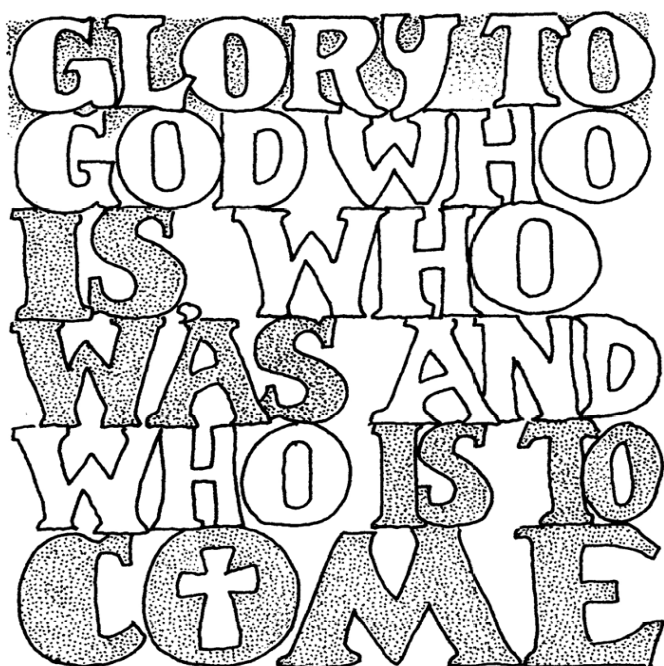
