LIVING AS *LIGHT* IN GOD'S CREATION

In today's Gospel (Luke 16:1-13), Luke's Jesus lets us know everything will change for those who decide to be his followers. Discipleship is not a part-time job; our whole lives revolve around our decision to be other Christs. That's why he brings up the case of the "squandering" steward.

Luke isn't encouraging his readers to find ways to shortchange their employers, but to be as creative in being good as the steward is creative in being bad. Faith cannot be simply a sideline that sometimes squeezes into an other-directed life. We often do good for someone, but it's not at the center of our scheduled day.

Jesus observes, "The children of this world are more prudent in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light." Our fundamental option is obviously where we spend our time and exert our effort. It makes sense that "No servant can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and riches."

Later, in Chapter 18, Luke will copy much of Mark's Chapter 10 narrative in which Jesus talks about how hard it is for a rich person to "enter the kingdom of God." A camel has a better chance of getting through the eye of a needle. Jesus isn't saying the wealthy can't get into heaven; he is simply stating that if someone's life quest is to make money, she or he will never discover God working effectively in their lives here and now, long before they go through the pearly gates.

Both the Gospel Jesus and the historical Jesus are concerned with people getting the most out of life. Our fundamental option is the first step in reaching that goal. If our faith is on the perimeter of our lives, no matter how many religious actions we perform, we will never accomplish what God intends for us.

Helping Adults with the Sacraments of Initiation

Dear Friends,

I will never forget the look on Mr. Yoneda's face when I first met him. He sat there that night with his arms crossed and wearing a huge frown. We were sitting around the table at a meeting for people who were thinking about becoming Catholics. Mr. Yoneda had fallen in love with Ms. Kataoka (not their real names) - a caring and intelligent young woman from a very traditional Nagasaki Catholic family. Ms. Kataoka's father was not insisting that Mister Yoneda become a Catholic, but he wanted to make sure that the young man had a good idea of what he was getting himself into if he were to marry his daughter.

Mr. Yoneda had graduated from a very prestigious Japanese university. He had a good job and a promising career ahead of him. And he was the kind of person who had low tolerance for nonsense. At this point in time my Japanese language ability was not that great. I had finished two years at the Jesuit Japanese language school less than two years before that. Every Thursday night was a struggle. I prepared each session as thoroughly as I could, but it seemed that almost every week Mr. Yoneda asked me a question that was hard for me to understand and even harder for me to answer in my faltering Japanese.

But grace was at work! People in my circle of friends, people in the Kataoka family - lots of people were praying for Mr. Yoneda. And gradually, God changed Mr. Yoneda's heart. It was a privilege for me to be part of that and to watch God's grace work in his life. After about a year, he received the light of faith, but chose to continue to pray and to study for one more year before receiving Baptism.

The last time I visited Nagasaki was in May of 2013. Mr. Yoneda is no longer a member of the Augustinian parish there. He came to see me! He now lives in another part of the city, where he is a lector at Mass and at that time, the president of the Parish Council.

We didn't have RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults) when I was in Japan. It was mostly priests, and sometimes catechists who prepared

people for the Sacraments of Initiation. Working these past six years at OLGC in Staten Island, I had the opportunity to get to know first hand how the RCIA works.

Coming to OMGC, I was so glad to know that there is an RCIA ministry team here in this parish. And I'll tell you why:

Grace manifests itself in truly beautiful ways in the RCIA process

– in two directions:

First the candidates are transformed through their contact with the parish community and through their encounter with Jesus Christ in Word and in Sacrament. At the same time, the parish community is changed, gladdened, enriched and empowered through their interaction with the candidates and by witnessing the powerful way that God works in their lives.

In the next week or so, ask the Holy Spirit to point out to you a person or persons in your family or circle of friends who you know is searching for something missing in their lives – perhaps a Catholic who has not yet been confirmed or made First Communion – or perhaps a non-Catholic who is searching for deeper meaning. Ask the Holy Spirit for the right words to say to invite them to the Inquiry Sessions that start on September 27th.

And bring them along!

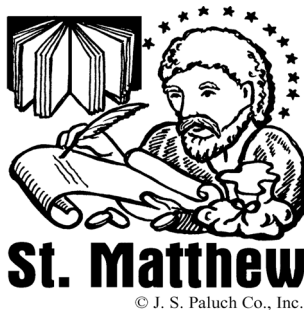

JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY

December 8, 2015-November 20, 2016

Mercy is one thing, malpractice quite another. Why, then, does the defrauded master in Jesus' parable praise the devious steward? Jesus shows by example how to sanctify material goods: by placing all our resources, indeed our very selves, at the service of others. No matter how costly such service, or how minimal the return, such charity is the wisest investment, yielding a reward that is literally out of this world. For Amos and Jesus, authentic worship of God demands practical charity toward our neighbors. Paul, too, declares that the only worship acceptable to God is offered by a community rich in charity. Liturgy must be matched to life, "lifting up holy hands, without anger or argument." This *Jubilee Year of Mercy* challenges us to live as "children of light," as devoted to self-sacrificing service as "the children of this world" are to serving themselves, and as enthusiastic for God's kingdom of justice as we are about less-enduring treasures.

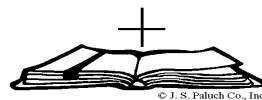

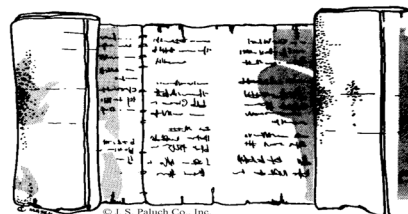
